**Introduction to Public Policy: How to Change the World offered by Brown University
(with co-teacher Phillip!)**

[Course Flyer](#) | [Syllabus](#): This course, Introduction to Public Policy: How to change the world, provides a roadmap to empower you to make a difference in the world. The goal of this course is to deepen your understanding of how American public policy, as in the solutions to problems that our communities confront, is developed. This course is designed with a particular emphasis on political actors, institutions and context. From interest groups to mayors and the role of the media in foreign affairs we will continually ask: how and why do some issues gain traction with the American public (and decision makers) and others ignored? We will examine how public policy is crafted, negotiated and enacted. It is a complicated story – one worth understanding. The goal of this course is to provide future leaders with conceptual tools for analyzing the environment in which policy is made. APPLICATION REQUIRED.

The Arts in New York City with CUNY Guttman (ART 200)

This course introduces students to a range of artistic forms, venues, media, and movements in the arts mecca that is New York City. In this semester long course, students will be exposed to visual and performance arts as well as public, private, and community-based arts institutions. They will explore a broad range of art forms through texts, images, and experiential components (visits to museums, art walks, film screenings). Students will be introduced to and develop visual literacy skills by closely and carefully examining works of art, discussing their observations, and supporting their views using evidence from the art works. Students will develop the critical visual literacy skills needed to discuss meaning and interpretation, audience, source, access, and the impact of works of art on the individual. Course assignments include interpretation, analysis, and synthesis of creative work of many forms. *This course satisfies the flexible core designation for CUNY of Creative Expression. Course Eligibility: open only to 10th graders with a High School GPA of 70+ by CUNY policy.* APPLICATION REQUIRED.

Sign Language (ASL)

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Introduction to Sociology (Soci 102)

Advanced Placement (AP) Principles of Computer Science (year-long course)

How can I create something that no one has imagined before? In this course, we will explore the fundamentals of computing: problem solving, programming, working with data, understanding the Internet, and cybersecurity. All Upper House students are invited to take this course regardless of your previous background, current interests, or intended college and career track. We will complete projects such as developing a password generator, creating a computer game, and designing your own Instagram filter. The course will culminate in two performance tasks and an end of course exam to earn AP credit. As you learn the art and science of digital technology, you will become a reflective producer, rather than

simply a consumer, of our digital world.

Note: If you are in AP United States History and/or AP Computer Science it is a year-long class.

Junior Selectives

Sign Language (ASL)

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Spanish

Mary Ann

This course explores the Spanish language through contemporary art forms including music, poetry and theater while students learn to appreciate the various Latin American dialects. Native students will use their background knowledge of Latin America to explore emerging issues as portrayed by media and derive some understanding as to how the Latin American society is faring on social equity issues. Students will be expected to provide a verbal presentation and a written reflection in Spanish based on a range of options they can choose from as part of their culminating task for this course.

Senior Selectives

AP Biology

Dr. Angelo Garcia

In this college-level science class, Study the core scientific principles, theories, and processes that govern living organisms and biological systems. You'll do hands-on laboratory work to investigate natural phenomena.

AP Macroeconomics

Explore the principles of economics that apply to an economic system as a whole. You'll use graphs, charts, and data to analyze, describe, and explain economic concepts and models.

Feminist Controversies (Fall 2023 semester only)

Will the #MeToo movement really change sexual violence and workplace harassment? Is marriage a dying institution? Do feminists have to be pro-choice? What about a men's movement? This class will explore a wide variety of heated debates, including how feminists, politicians, and other scholars have responded to and theorized around issues such as abortion rights, sex and body image, equal pay, marriage, imperialism, disabilities, and sex work. We will discuss personal experiences, read challenging feminist theory and responses to it, scour blogs, analyze popular television shows and movies through a gendered lens, and read the novel *Juliet Takes a Breath*, before exploring the three "waves" of feminism and their historical impacts. Classes will center on rigorous, college-style seminars and debates, with students responsible for regularly posting reading responses and leading discussion. Action projects will include designing solutions to an issue of your choice through submitting op-eds, sending policy memos to politicians, circulating PSAs on social media, leading peer workshops, interviewing community members, or designing a film festival. Class visitors and potential field trips will help us examine how groups in New York City are mobilizing around and responding to these issues.

Living My Best Life (Spring semester only)**Andy Snyder**

Who do you know that's especially good at life? Could you become the kind of person who takes care of yourself, creates, gets stuff done, earns the love and trust of others, knows what you're doing and why, dodges drama, and enjoys almost every day? In this course we will work together to get better at;

- Developing healthy habits and exploring the ideas of great thinkers
- Asking sharp questions and taking strong notes
- Emancipating ourselves and writing essays
- Making sense of our own lives and situation and making short films
- Teaming up and getting ready to win

Pretty much every day in this class we'll have time to think together about something important, discuss, read a famous text, hear a poem or song, do something creative, watch a short film, learn something new, and connect it all to our own lives. This course should help you grow your soul, develop your mind, and strengthen your relationships.
